



> Discover UNO's Master of Science in Data Science, a flexible and innovative interdisciplinary program designed to elevate student's expertise in data analytics, machine learning, and business intelligence. A cross-college collaboration between the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Business Administration, and the College of Information Science & Technology. Students complete the program in just 24 months while mastering data organization, visualization, and the creation of impactful data products. There are opportunities to collaborate with leading experts across business, IT, and mathematics, to prepare for leadership roles in today's data-driven world.

UNO's Urban Health Opportunities Program

(UHOP) aims to strengthen the healthcare workforce by supporting students committed to serving underserved urban communities in Nebraska.
 Offering tuition assistance, mentorship from UNMC medical students, and MCAT prep, UHOP ensures scholars are well-prepared for medical school.
 Successful participants are guaranteed admission to UNMC's M.D. program, making it an exceptional pathway for aspiring physicians.

HIPPOCRATIC OATH (MODERN VERSION) UNO's Medical Humanities program offers a unique interdisciplinary approach to exploring the connections between health, culture, and society. Integrating perspectives from the humanities, social sciences, and arts, the program equips students to address complex issues in healthcare, such as ethics, wellness, and the human experience of illness. Ideal for those pursuing careers in healthcare, social work, or public health, this program fosters a deep understanding of the human side of medicine.

NATIONAL COUNTERTERRORISM INNOVATION, TECHNOLOGY, AND EDUCATION CENTER

Achievements and Initiatives

A two-year research project, funded by a DHS CP3 grant, developed cutting-edge **chatbot technology** for threat reporting, leading to a 2024 patent and potential nationwide adoption, thanks to the collaboration of Criminologist **Erin Kearns, Ph.D.**, and IT Innovator **Joel Elson, Ph.D.**

Future **national security professionals** are fostered by employing and immersing students in various activities, funding 66 graduate assistantships since 2020, including 25 in the past year.

NCITE's second in-person conference in Omaha gathered **U.S. and European consortium partners** and featured prominent **counterterrorism voices** from the White House and Department of Homeland Security.


A new **Speaker Series** features national security leaders and academics discussing targeted violence, terrorism prevention, and sense-making.

Presentations were hosted in Omaha and Washington, D.C., on **workforce resilience**, as counterterrorism research and work is psychologically demanding.

A \$2 million grant was secured to develop **International Academic Partnerships for Science and Security (IAPSS)**, an information-sharing, workforce development enterprise for counterterrorism among allied countries.

Expanded communications now include the "**NCITE Insights**" podcast featuring consortium experts and an **election security resources** web page.

NCITE moved into the Scott Technology Center in the fall of 2023 allowing for the consolidation of students, faculty, and staff into one building. After renovations, University of Nebraska system leaders, Nebraska community leaders, NCITE's national security partners and over 200 guests gathered for the ribbon cutting celebration. The new headquarters offers this growing organization a larger and more secure space.







COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

UNO's College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) goes beyond providing students with the skills for today's job market. We provide students with an education that enriches their lives and fosters the analytical, critical, and creative thinking skills that will help them create the positions of tomorrow.

Points of Pride


- To reach more learners, CAS is developing a **first-year experience course** intended to provide **academic and personal support** while helping students explore academic majors and programs.
- The Department of World Languages and Literature engaged the community through its first **Language Fair** reaching 300 area high school students.
- CAS facilitated over **60 internships and practicums** to connect students to the workforce.
- The Health Careers Resource Center sponsored the **Pre-Health symposium**, which hosted **1,200 high school juniors** with area businesses, non-profits organizations, and academic insitutation/programs.



In July 2024, Dr. Melanie Bloom became the first woman to lead the College of Arts and Sciences as Dean. Dr. Bloom, with a Ph.D. in Applied Linguistics, has been with UNO since 2005 and has held various leadership positions. She is praised for her experience, dedication, and vision, and is expected to further elevate the academic excellence of the college.

NATO Model Event Held at UNO

NATO Allied Command Transformation facilitated a NATO Model Event at UNO. Students represented NATO member nations during a simulated North Atlantic Council session focused on the High North's geopolitical and climate challenges. This event, organized by UNO professors and supported by NATO staff, allowed students to research, negotiate, and reach consensus on NATO strategies. The event aimed to educate and engage students in NATO's decision-making processes, enhancing their understanding of the Alliance's roles and responsibilities.



4 Years, 5 Degrees

David Saenz Zuniga graduated in May 2024 with BA and BS degrees from CAS in five disciplines: International Studies (Global Strategic Studies concentration), Latino/Latin American Studies, World Languages (Spanish concentration), Economics, and Political Science (Foreign and National Security Affairs concentration). He also earned a minor in Geography.



Endangered Bat Research

Dr. Han Li (Biology) and his team are researching endangered bat species to enhance conservation practices and raise public awareness. This study focuses on grassland bat foraging ecology and the impact of habitat loss and white-nose syndrome. In 2023, UNO found that the tricolored bat, proposed to be listed as endangered, preferred restored grasslands over agricultural lands. Acoustic data for other endangered bats were also collected. With the Wild Kingdom grant, UNO will expand its research to more sites.

Opioid Research Addressing Current Limitations

Researchers in the CAS are tackling the US opioid epidemic from both a neuroscientific and public health perspective. With a grant from Peter F. McManus Charitable Trust Research Grants, Dr. Erik Garcia (Psychology) is hoping to identify new ways to mitigate opioid use disorder by addressing the limitations of current treatments.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

CBA's nationally recognized undergraduate and graduate programs are creating the next generation of Leaders, Entrepreneurs, Analysts, Decision-makers, Executives, Researchers, and Socially responsible citizens. We are creating the **LEADERS** for Omaha, Nebraska, and beyond!

The Capstone Cup is a semester-long event for seniors to apply classroom knowledge to real-world business problems for Omaha companies. Students work in teams to research and present solutions, initially pitching to company leaders, local professionals, and industry experts. Finalists make a formal pitch and participate in a Q&A with community judges. Designed by Management Professors Erin Pleggenkuhle-Miles and Erin Bass, this flagship experience offers practical consulting experience for CBA students.

The Economics Research Seminar connected 163 unique community members including students, industry professionals, government officials, and faculty,

fostering diverse insights through monthly sessions.

CBA's 2024 summer camps welcomed 39 high school students from across Nebraska to explore careers in banking, finance, accounting, real estate, and economics, with enrollment on track for 60 students next summer.

Career Services increased employer participation in the Fall and Spring **Career Fairs** from 50 to over 70, with a record attendance of over 425 students at the Fall Fair, increasing workforce associations.

The EMBA program now offers more flexibility to students with an updated curriculum to remain current with changing business trends and educational needs. Enrollment in the **MBA program** surged by 33%, addressing workforce demand by preparing more highly skilled professionals for leadership roles.



10 years of the CBA Capstone Cup

Department of Economics Professor Catherine Y. Co is a strong advocate for the Fulbright Program. Dr. Co has completed two Fulbright Fellowships, a four-week assignment at the International School - Thai Nguyen University (ISTNU) in Vietnam as a Fulbright Specialist in 2023, and a 10-month assignment as a Fulbright U.S. Scholar in 2014-15 at International University - Vietnam National University, Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, HEALTH, AND HUMAN SCIENCES

CEHHS offers diverse undergraduate and graduate programs in areas like teacher preparation, counseling, biomechanics, public health, educational leadership, and special education. Its six innovative units develop dedicated practitioners, scholars, and citizens. The college's 24 programs support the campus's mission, address local workforce needs, and contribute through internationally recognized research. Students benefit from advanced facilities and community-partnered learning.

The innovative **Teacher Scholars Academy**, part of the Department of Teacher Education, is working towards educating all by securing funding to support 38 new undergraduates per year, over the next 2-3 years.



OOO The Department of Educational Leadership held the Midwest's first two-day **Community** Leadership & Education Summit with nearly 1,000 attendees and an evening reception for local educational leaders.



The UNO Pitching Lab, a collaboration of researchers in the School of Health and Kinesiology and the Department of Biomechanics, drew global athletes for analysis and received significant press during March Madness and the College World Series through interactive community engagement.



CEHHS students in the Community Counseling Clinic and the Speech and Language **Clinic** supported hundreds of community members with student-led services supervised by expert faculty.



, supported by the School of Health and Kinesiology, nears completion with 32,000 square feet of advanced lab space opening in November 2024. These labs will enhance research in Exercise and Vascular Physiology, Sports Medicine, Early Childhood Development, and Physical and Intellectual Disabilities. The facility fosters student engagement, community-partnered research, and collaboration with national partners, equipping future clinicians, researchers, and practitioners to improve health outcomes.

The SECD department launched the fully online **Dyslexia Certificate**, a 15-18 hour graduate program with five new courses. Funded by private foundations, the first cohort includes 20 students. CEHHS is working closely with NUF for potential funders for an additional 47 graduates students from across Nebraska. The program also involves community dyslexia specialists to help students practice diagnosing and intervening with dyslexia.

\$11M NIH Grant for Cardiovascular Research in **Biomechanics**

The Department of Biomechanics (BMCH), led by Dr. Alexey Kamenskiy, received an \$11M NIH grant to establish the Center for Cardiovascular Research in Biomechanics (CRiB) at UNO. CRiB will address cardiovascular disease challenges and enhance CEHHS' research capabilities. This effort aims to develop novel treatments and devices for cardiovascular diseases, while funding undergraduate and graduate student research, establishing UNO as a leader in biomechanics-related prototype development.

The Nebraska Literacy Project, led by Dr. Jennifer Lemke, trains 6,000 K-3 teachers statewide in the Science of Reading over three years. Supported by the Departments of Teacher Education, Special Education, and Educational Leadership, the project offers a five-day hybrid professional development, resulting in a UNO micro-credential and either a stipend or CEHHS graduate course tuition. Involving many campus partners, it will reach 800 teachers in the first year.

COLLEGE OF COMMUNICATION, FINE ARTS AND MEDIA

In the College of Communication, Fine Arts and Media (CFAM), our students find the right balance of academics and application to prepare them for their career. Whether that means teaching, creating, performing, or communicating—or some combination of those—CFAM graduates know their educational experience will help them make an impact in the world.

Melissa Jackson Burns, an MFA in Writing graduate student at the School of the Arts, received the prestigious **University of Nebraska Presidential Graduate Fellowship** for the 2024-25 academic year, which includes a \$15,000 stipend from the Elmer C. Rhoden Merit Scholarship.



School of Communication students have earned national acclaim, with the **MavForensics** team consistently ranking in the top 20, **Public Relations and Advertising** students receiving top industry awards, and **MavRadio** ranked 5th in the nation.

Michael B. Jones, M.D., pledged \$1 Million to establish the **Michael Bruce Jones**, **M.D., Chair** in the School of the Arts. **Amy Millicent Morris**, Ph.D., Director of the School of the Arts and Professor of Art History, will be named the inaugural recipient.

Omaha Area Youth Orchestras join UNO

In a recent collaboration, the Omaha Area Youth Orchestras (OAYO) joined the University of Nebraska at Omaha School of Music on July 1, 2024. OAYO has worked closely with Dr. Karen Fannin, Director of the UNO School of Music, on a transition plan. "We are thrilled to welcome the Omaha Area Youth Orchestras to the UNO School of Music," Fannin said. "OAYO has enriched the lives of thousands of musicians since their founding in 1958 and we look forward to continuing this strong tradition."



The School of Communication is creating programs that engage learners in new and innovative ways. Through fast-track certificate programs such as the courses in Communicating in Remote Work Environments and Power Presentations: Effective Public Speaking Strategies or their sync-flex delivery (simultaneous in-person and synchronous remote) of the Master of Arts in Communication, the School of Communication is responsive to today's learners.



Summer Music Theatre Academy

The Summer Music Theatre Academy (SMTA) provides high school students with hands-on experience in all aspects of theatre production in a professional, supportive setting. Under the guidance of UNO professors and industry professionals, students engage deeply with Omaha's arts culture, and community. With performances on campus and at downtown Omaha's Gene Leahy Mall, SMTA has become a hallmark summer event. SMTA completed its third season performing **Legally Blonde.** Since the academy's beginning in 2022, SMTA students have preformed in front of an estimated 11,500 people.

COLLEGE OF INFORMATION SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY

IS&T is a regional leader supporting the state's workforce development in the tech field. With a student body of 1,412 students, IS&T offers five undergraduate degrees, seven master's degrees, and two Ph.D. degrees. In addition to its largest and most diverse student body in Computer Science, IS&T has several other signature programs, such as Cybersecurity with NSA's designation as a Center of Excellence in Cyber Defense and Cyber Operations, collaborative degrees in Biomedical Informatics and Computer Science Education, Data Science, and the newly rebranded Applied Computing and Informatics Degree. The experiential initiatives and network of corporate and not-for-profit partners allow students to have curriculum experiences with real-life projects and access to summer and year-long internships.

- IS&T experienced **8% growth** in undergraduate and **9% growth** in graduate **enrollment** last year, reflecting the rising recognition of tech careers in Nebraska and nationally.
- New **guided transfer pathways** were launched for Metro and Southeast Community College students to seamlessly earn Bachelor's degrees.
- There was**\$4.7M in research expenditures** from over 40 active grants, a 30% increase in proposals.
- Over \$300,000 was raised for **scholarships**, **activities**, **and research**, and a classroom renovation for an innovative **code studio** was completed, thanks to a gift from FNBO.
- Dr. Jorge Fandinno received a prestigious NSF CAREER grant, the second in the university's history, and Dr. Kwangsung Oh received an NSF-EPSCOR First Award. Four new tenure-track faculty with start in Fall 2024, one of whom holds another NSF CAREER award.

Nebraska University Center for Cybersecurity (NebraskaCYBER)

NebraskaCYBER has earned NSA designations as a National Center of Academic Excellence in Cyber Defense and Cyber Operations. The center supports academic excellence through NSF-funded scholarships and K-12 camps, along with cybersecurity research funded by many federal agencies to protect our nation's critical infrastructures. For example, Dr. George Grispos is leading a research initiative to educate American Indian food producers about cybersecurity concerns and challenges on modern farms.

Al Technology - IS&T is Ready

IS&T is well-positioned to leverage recent AI technological advances and its convergence in many domains. The faculty's deep AI expertise have formed many impactful interdisciplinary collaborations. For example, Dr.Jorge Fandinno Garcia, focuses on transparent, reliable, and understandable AI systems by enabling formal reasoning with quantitative data, improving their effectiveness and explanatory capabilities.



Partnerships and Transfer Pathways

IS&T continues to make education affordable by expanding its partnerships with Metro Community College and hosting IT transfer pathway events to increase awareness of its Computer Science, Management Information Systems, and Cybersecurity programs. It also collaborates with the MetroMAVS initiative to provide students with advising and UNO IS&T experiences. Similar guided pathways are being developed with Southeast Community College.

With accreditation from the **Network of Schools of Public Policy, Affairs, and Administration (NASPAA)** and the **Council on Social Work Education (CSWE)**, our programs ensure that students receive a high-quality education.





Aviation Institute

Opportunity for commercial flight careers nationwide has led to unprecedented student interest in our Aviation Institute programs. Through concentrations in air transportation administration, professional flight and uncrewed aircraft systems, students have unparalleled experiences. The institute has state of the art flight simulator training to complement their time in the air. Dr. Victor Huang is ensuring operational safety through his recent funded research project"Towards Smart Aviation: Harnessing Intelligent, Data-driven Technologies and Analytics for Elevated Flight Safety and Airport Operations."



Researching to Reducing Labor Traficking

The School of Criminology and Criminal Justice leads CPACS in academic excellence with more than 37 externally funded research grants and contracts. Of state and national importance is an exemplary effort led by Drs. Teresa Kulig and Sadaf Hashimi in Nebraska. Their research team of students and faculty are working to enhance actionable responses to identifying and reducing labor trafficking while also assessing the impact of trafficking crimes on survivors. Through this and many other experiences, students are gaining real-time experience in shaping policy and practices that enhance the safety of our Nebraska communities.



Grace Abbott School of Social Work

As Nebraska's largest social work program, the Grace Abbott School of Social Work is gaining national recognition for social policy research and workforce development. Over 90% of Nebraska's social workers are graduates! The Grace Abbott Training and Supervision Academy provided over 400 supervision sessions and issued more than 6,000 continuing education credits to social workers and mental health practitioners.





Internationalization in Nebraska Communities

In October 2023, the Center for Afghanistan and Regional Studies began courses for more than 290 Nebraska educators developed to address the gaps in cultural understanding and better support newcomer refugee students and families from Afghanistan. Besides offering practical content on topics related to Afghan culture, the course covers topics related to general knowledge about refugees and the trauma of displacement as well as the stress of resettlement and acculturation. This broader knowledge will be relevant to support other refugee populations.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The generosity of our community's philanthropists is a cornerstone of our success, enabling us to reach new heights and transform lives. In 2023-2024 the following scholarships, professorships, chairs, and projects were funded by generous community donors.

The College of Arts and Sciences **Rinn Returning** Student Fund to encourage students to return to UNO for degree completion.

Extended the **CBA Prep Academy**, enhancing academic skills, exposure, and college pathways for high school participants, including first-generation, low-income, and/or underrepresented students.







DUAL ENROLLMENT

UNO's dual enrollment program aims to increase access to higher education for Nebraska students and families, decrease costs, and provide a bridge to a four-year college degree by providing affordable access to high-quality UNO credit-bearing courses at high schools throughout the Omaha metropolitan region and beyond.

Highlights



nearly **4,000** students enrolled in dual enrollment courses





Initiatives

In 2023-24, the dual enrollment program provided more than \$450,000 directly to partner high schools to support initiatives designed to maintain high-quality dual enrollment courses and increase student participation.

UNO has been proactive in identifying solutions to the region's shortage of dual enrollment teachers. Faculty have developed graduate-level coursework and partnerships tailored to high school teachers in high-demand areas like Computer Science Education, Math Education, English, Economics Education, History, and Government.

UNO's dual enrollment program has covered the cost of graduate tuition for nearly 100 Nebraska high school teachers over the past 5 years to complete advanced coursework needed to qualify to teach dual enrollment courses in local high schools

CENTER FOR FACULTY EXCELLENCE (CFE)

Faculty Coaching

CFE launched Faculty Coaching, a pilot program centered on solution-focused, holistic faculty development, in April 2023. Coaching is based on individual needs and topics of interest and participant autonomy to choose and complete goals. Full-time faculty are eligible for five free, confidential sessions per semester. To date, 45 individuals have participated with an average of four coaching sessions/participant. A coaching coordinator, Monica Blizek, and a faculty coach, Brigette Ryalls, facilitate the program.

"I have taken several big steps as a result of coaching. I feel more empowered and less alienated at work. This shift has not gone unnoticed by my colleagues and family. I now talk about what the next decade will look like rather than how to survive the week."

TANDEM (Thoughtful Advice. Nurtured Diversity. Engagement Mentorship.)

"I am so thankful for the interactions I've had with my mentor we remain connected and have had many fruitful conversations. My professional life is definitely better for knowing my mentor."

The program transitioned from its pilot status to become a standard offering of the Center for Faculty Excellence that facilitates interdepartmental mentoring of second and third-year faculty. Fifty-six faculty members participated in 2023-24. Since its inception three years ago, over 70 faculty members have participated with 53% from under-represented groups.
